# **Writing Tasks**

Combining grammar instruction with creative or directed student writing has never been easier for the teacher and more fun for the students! This Grammar Focus tool has proven to be a great asset to me in my efforts to get students to *re-connect* their *dis-connects* when it comes to actually *applying* grammar and punctuation rules to their personal reading and writing projects!

#### This process works really well for me when teaching the Grammar Focus:

- 1. Have students correct the sentences as they think each should be. (5 minutes)
- 2. Ask a student to reveal how many corrections he or she made in the 1<sup>st</sup> sentence!
- 3. Ask for a show of hands of those who came up with the same number.
- 4. If the student's number wasn't quite right, repeat with another student!
- 5. This makes the process a game the students love to play! After the right answer surfaces, or someone gets pretty close to it, congratulate the winner(s) and verify that the answers were indeed accurate!
- 6. At the end of the verifying process, have a student read the sentences together as a single story and paraphrase it. The theme of the story will be the theme of the accompanying writing prompt.
- 7. Students now get to immediately *apply* their recently practiced grammar and punctuation skills to an authentic writing situation that always relates to the theme of the scene!
- 8. Have students use the attached Thirty-Six Stars Rubric to both guide their paragraph(s) content and organization and also to score it (them) using a "trade & grade" approach! It's fun and productive!
